Course Description:

This course is designed to familiarise students with skills which combine visual research, photographic composition, analogue camera operation and printing, together with conceptual ideas, especially those of narrative photography. Students provide their own film and photographic paper. A studio fee is levied on this course. The University has cameras for student use, although it is recommended that students provide their own manual 35mm SLR camera. *A studio fee is levied on this course.*

Aims and Objectives:

The course is designed for the student to learn and acquire a strong basis in black and white photography. This includes camera work in the mechanical sense and the ability to both construct and deconstruct images, particularly in the area of the narrative.

Teaching Methodology:

The course material is presented through lectures, demonstrations, discussions, computer and slide presentations. Practical work is assigned and reviewed at each stage of progress. The work of a variety of important photographers is viewed and discussed and museum and exhibition visits are encouraged. Individual and group critiques of project work produced takes place when appropriate throughout the semester.
