Course Description:

ITALIAN STUDY CENTRES ONLY. This course examines ethnicity and, to a lesser extent nationalism, as the basis of social and political belonging and differentiation and as the source of both creativity and conflict. Starting with the premise that identity is socially constructed, the course looks at the ways in which ethnic identity has been formed and used in different societies; different theories of ethnicity are explored. Topics covered include the relationship between nation-states, national and transnational minorities, and issues of social integration. Migration, immigration, and emigration phenomena are studied in relation to national identity and ethnicity. Experiences of ethnic cleansing and genocidal politics are also touched upon. The course looks at a series of current and past case studies in Europe, including the Jewish, Italian, Gypsy, and German experiences.

Prerequisites:

Aims and Objectives:

The course aims to introduce students to key theoretical literature on ethnicity, identity, and nationalism, and to help them understand how these intersect with other forms of identity such as religion and culture. It aims to provide students with

the opportunity to explore the rich diversity of ethnicity, national identity, and religion in contemporary Europe, and to examine contemporary debates about the meaning of cultural diversity and the strategies currently being deployed by government and non-government agencies to deal with diversity and social cohesion.
